
With the exception of a couple of minor items and some outstanding deficiencies, construction at our school is almost complete.

Buddy Geometry Room 209 and 101

Based on the principles of Islamic design and the use of geometric patterning blocks, Mr. Cunningham's Grade 2 class consulted with students in the Home School Program (HSP) to design tiles that emit light. The two classes have been working closely, since October, with a parent/community business. They worked collaboratively in the second floor tool suite to produce a cardboard template of their tile. The design was then put onto graph paper and together, the students discovered how to place (x,y) coordinates on a Cartesian plane. Their designs were then plotted onto graph paper.

The students in HSP were taught how to make a technical drawing using AutoCAD. These drawings will be used to communicate the designs to a sheet metal laser cutting machine. Each student will walk away by the end of the year with a metal tile that they have created in collaboration with a geometry buddy.

The goal of the project is for students to come to an understanding of the manufacturing process i.e. steps involved from beginning to completion. In this heightened era of consumerism and instant gratification, students are often unaware of the work involved. This process is teaching them patience, perseverance, and is helping them strengthen their creative, collaboration and communication skills; skills that will be very useful for all of their academic and work place endeavours in the 21st century.


**The Nest: Book Review by Maryam in Room 201**
